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Four stories in height with a five-story tower, Reid Hall is composed of a large central block and several projecting wings arranged in an approximately L-shaped plan. The masonry walls of natural granite blocks are marked by a belt course between the second and third floors, and a corbelled battlemented parapet which conceals the flat roof.

The original structure consists of the three-bay main block A one-story porch, accessible from the interior by means of a series of French windows, extends the length of three sides. The five-story tower occupies the projecting central bay of the south or front elevation and contains the main entrance and porte-cochere. A turret, originally located at the southeast corner of the tower has been removed..

The wings are laid out asymmetrically but they generally lie in an easterly and westerly direction from the central block. A projection on the south elevation of the T-shaped west wing contains two sets of rectangular mullion windows, and a terrace at the west end forms a porte-cochere for the door at the cellar level. An octagonal room projects from the east wing.

The first floor and the main halls on the second and third floors have remained relatively unchanged. The interior of the main hall and the stairs are of pink Numidian marble from Georgia, with accents of yellow Numidian marble from Africa. The rooms in the main block are of French influence, each panelled with carved oak or mahogany inlaid with curly maple and mother-of-pearl, and the ceilings are coffered in plaster. The main rooms on the first floor of the west wing are in the Jacobian style and panelled with oak. There is one Tiffany-style skylight above the main hall on the third floor. The floors in the main hall on the second and third floors are of marble mosaic tiles.

The upper stories and the secondary halls have been significantly altered to accommodate the needs of the school.

Northeast of the dwelling stands a small one-story stone chapel with a contiguous, circular, two-story stone tower.

aissance Revival castle, Reid Hall was designed in 1892 by Stanford White. Originally constructed as the home of Whitelaw Reid, owner and editor-in-chief of the New York Herald Tribune, the building is now the administrative center and focal point of the Manhattanville College campus.

Ophir Farms was purchased in 1887 by Mr. and Mrs. Whitelaw Reid from Ben Holladay, a contractor and merchant in the American West. The original house burned the following year and Reid commissioned Stanford White to build what is now the main block of the present structure. Completed in 1892, Ophir or Reid Hall was built in the style of a Renaissance Revival Castle. Reid also hired Frederick Law Olmstead to landscape the 1,714 acre estate.

The interior was lavishly decorated in the French style. The interiors of the two French parlors were imported from Chateau Villense in France and reinstalled to the east of the main hall. It was said at the time to be the "most perfect example of Louis XIV work ever seen in America." The interiors of the other two main rooms on the first floor came from the home of Darius Mills (Reid's father-in-law) in New York City.

In 1912 Reid commissioned the firm of McKim, Mead and White to build on a large library wing and to erect a guest cottage on the estate. This wing was decorated in the Jacobean style, panelled in oak. The library, a large room two stories in height at the end of the wing, originally contained some stained glass windows from a cathedral in England.

Whitelaw Reid, as the owner and editor-in-chief of the New York Herald Tribune, minister to France, special ambassador to England, and a one-time Republican nominee for vice-president, entertained graciously at Ophir Hall. Among his more prominent guests were Henry James, Anthony Eden, and Calvin Coolidge. Reid died while in England in 1912, never

having seen the completed Ophir Hall. His wife returned there for only a short time, placing the house in the care of her son Ogden, who continued to reside there. When Prajadhipok, the King of Siam, came to the United States for an operation, he and his entourage stayed at Ophir Hall.

The house remained in the Reid family until it was bought by Manhattanville College in 1951. It now serves as the administration building for the college.

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
