ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE of area. (Describe physical setting, general character, and architecturally significant structures).

Fisher Hill, once called Mount Vernon or Henshaw Hill, is 240 feet above sea level and is bunded by Boylston Street, Chestnut Hill Avenue, Clinton Road and Sumner Road. Its south side overlooks the Brookline Reservoir, and its summit offers generous views of Brookline and Boston. The area consists primarily of large, free-standing single family residences, most of which were built during the last two decades of the 19th century and early decades of the 20th. There is a public elementary school as well as the classroom, dormitory, and administration buildings of the former Cardinal Cushing College, now occupied by another academic institution. The Longyear Historical Society sits on top on the hill on land once owned by the Longyear family, while the Galen Stone estate, over 11 acres with two mansions, a carriage house, and gatekeeper's cottage is undergoing conversion into a condominium development consisting of restored structures and new attached and free standing single family homes. Two reservoirs, one opened and one covered, are lo-cated on the top of the hill, on either side of Fisher Avenue. HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE of area. (Explain development of area, what caused it, and how it affected community; be specific).

The residential neighborhood of Fisher Hill as we know it today was laid out in 1884 by Frederick Law Olmsted. It received its name from an early 19th century landowner and resident, Francis Fisher, who bought Nathaniel Seaver's property, tore town his house, and built a new one on the site (now also demolished). Like a number of landowners in the area, Fisher was a commission merchant; he worked in the firm of E.S and F.K. Fisher and J.B. Robinson whose offices were located on Central Wharf in Boston.

Fisher Hill has traditionally been the home of some of Brookline's more illustrious citizens. During the 18th century, Dr. Zabdiel Boylston lived in a house which still stands; it is one of the oldest homes in the town, with a rear ell dating from c. 1660. We know the main part of the house was constructed c. 1736 by Thomas Boylston, Zabdiel's father. Zabdiel gained famed by introducing innoculation against smallpox in 1721, much to the disapproval of the clergy who preferred to view smallpox as God's punishment for man's sinful nature.

Another resident of the area was General Isaac Sparhawk Gardner whose house once stood on Chestnut Hill Avenue. Gardner was the son of Isaac Gardner, said to be the first Brookline citizen slain at the Battle of Lexington. His house was demolished by Samuel Henshaw who built a new house nearby. This house was later purchased by Jacob Pierce, a major figure in the development of Fisher Hill during the last decades of the 19th century.

# Architectural Significance (con't) (2)

With a few notable exceptions, the area presents a comprehensive collection of late 19th and early 20th century domestic architectural styles: Queen Anne, Shingle, Jacobethan, Colonial, Georgian, and Medieval Revival, and Craftsman. Two houses which do not fall into these categories are 617 Boylston Street, the Boylston-Hyslop-Lee House, which dates from the 1730s; and the Benjamin Goddard House, located at 43 Summer Road. The Goddard House is a fine example of the Federal style, having been built in 1810 with a low hip roof, four end chimneys, and a center entrance portico with slender fluted columns, and delicated fan and sidelights. \*\*

#### Non-Contributing Properties

The newest construction to be found within this area is a development called Fisher Hill Estates which has incorporated 4 structures from the former Joseph Huntington White/Galen Stone Estate with a series of detached and attached single family homes. The older buildings were: a brick and shingle mansion designed in 1880-1 by Peabody and Stearns in the Oueen Anne style and altered in 1914 by Chapman and Frazer to create a more Jacobethan style home; a carriage house, virtually unaltered since its construction in 1880-1, also designed by Peabody and Stearns in a superb and unequalled (in Brookline) expression of the Shingle style; a stone gatehouse, designed in the Mid 1890s by Shepley, Rutan, and Coolidge; and a large Georgian Revival style mansion, designed by Little and Russell in 1925-6. The substantial estate was landscaped according to the plans of-Frederick Law Olmsted and before the construction began in 1981, much of the design intent was intact. Unfortunately, the sweeping lawns are now dotted with "post-modernist" style structures and a small pond which law at the bottom of one of the hills is encroached upon by an asphalt driveway leading to some of the new houses. The existing four buildings have been drastically altered on the inside, with the two mansions converted into three units and the carriage house into five. Of all the older structures, the carriage house has been externally altered to the point where the original design is barely recognizable. The two mansions have also undergone exterior changes, including the additions of balconies and attached garages. The gatehouse has been altered, too, but not to the extent of the other structures. For these reasons, although Fisher Hill Estates has been included in the proposed district for itschisterical significance, its structures and their settings have been determined to be non-contributing properties.

Other non-contributing buildings include the present Fisher College campus; the Montrose School, and a handful of ranch style and "modern" single family homes.

\*\* Architects whose work can be found here include: Chapman and Frazer; Hartwell and Richardson; Clarence Blackall; Kilham and Hopkins; Shepley, Rutan, and Coolidge; Cabot, Everett, and Mead; and Peabody and Stearns.

The Fisher Hill district meets NR criteria A,B,and C, being an example of a planned residential community which developed in Brookline at the time of the Town's rapid suburbanization. It is a fine, intact example of a residential subdivision planned by Frederick Law and John Charles Olmsted; was home to such illustrious citizens as Galen Stone, Joseph Huntington White; John Longyear; Robert Andrews; Erich Leinsdorf; Arthur Fiedler; and Arthur Rotch; and cpntains many well preserved examples of late 19th century domestic architectural styles; Queen Anne, Shingle, Colonial and Medieval Revival, and Craftsman.

century included the heirs of Samuel Hammond; John Hayden, second husband of Jane Hyslop whose first husband, David, had been an owner of the Boylston house; Thomas Perkins, the merchant (who lived on Warren Street); and W.A. Humphrey, a farmer who lived on Newton Street. Henry Lee purchased the Hyslop estate in 1850; Lee was a partner in Lee, Higginson, the largest brokerage and banking house in Boston. Fisher Hill remained relatively undeveloped until the 1880's. Until that time, it consisted of large estates, like those belonging to Joseph White (535 Boylston Street) and to Henry Lee (617 Boylston Street). It is interesting to note that 33 and 83 Leicester Street were probably once part of the latter estate.

In 1884 the major landowners on the hill were Jacob Pierce; Joseph Huntington White; Arthur Rotch; the Goddard Land Company; Thomas Lee, son of Henry; and the heirs of Francis Fisher. Representatives of two of the principlia owners wrote to Olmsted, asking hime to design a subdivision plan for the hill and the adjoining area north and east of it, now the residential neighborhood south of the railroad tracks. Ernest Bowditch prepared the topographical survey for Fisher Hill, as he often did for Olmsted's projects in Brookline. In the subdivision plan submitted by Olmsted and his partner/ step-son John Charles Olmsted, the curvilinear type of plan was used to accomodate the irregular topography of the area. Olmsted's Fisher Hill subdivision is, according to one Olmsted scholar, "a masterpiece of **c**urvilinear planning, and it has become one of Brookline's most attractive and desirable neighborhoods."

Of the six major property owners in the area in .1884, Jacon Pierce was the most active in the development of Fisher Hill. Pierce was born in Newburyport in 1852; he came to Brookline with his father in 1865 and lived in the Henshaw House (demolished) on Chestnut Hill Avenue. In addition to his involvement with the North Star Mining Company, Pierce owned approximately eight million square feet of property on Fisher Hill, some of which had been purchased by his father. This land was bounded by the Fisher Estate to the south; Chestnut Hill Avenue to the west; an aqueduct belonging to the city of Boston to the north; and Arthur Rotch's holdings to the east. It was this area which Pierce and his brother Dean, a stockbroker, developed, sometimes simply selling building lots, and sometimes, particularly during the late 1890's. building bouses on speculation. Actually, building the houses was considered an unusual activity for developers at this time; like many speculator developers in Brookline, however, Pierce lived on part of his estate while subdividing the rest. Many of the houses were rented for a number of years before they were sold.

Among the houses built by Jacob Pierce and/or his brother were: 19 Willard Road; 123 Dean; 195 Fisher Avenue; and 299 and 294 Buckminster Road as well as 255, 271, and 285 Clinton Road and probably 107 and 129 Dean and 261 Clinton Road. In a number of cases, Winslow and Wetherell (and Bigelow), well known architects and perhaps most famous in Brookline for the design of the S.S. Pierce building, were the architects for the ses. brother, was the first, followed by Fisher, Buckminster, Hyslop, Holland, and Druce. Clinton and Buckminster, forming a continuous thoroughfare from Sumner Road to Fisher Avenue, was built in 1888 and were fifty feet wide, creating the elegant, spacious atmosphere which Pierce desired.

Pierce was described in his obituary as a community benefactor who had been determined to maintain Fisher Hill as a "high class" residential section. He repeatedly declined offers of purchase made for parts of his property, lest "he might sell it to someone who would not respect his desire that Fisher Hill remain unblemished by any structure not in harmony with the high character he wished the neighborhood to maintain."

Lots were sold to those who could afford to build houses conforming with the affluent character of the heighb phood. Lawyers, doctors, bankers, brokers, manufacturers, and publishers, many of whom worked in Boston, built their homes on Fisher Hill. By the early 1900's, the area had gained such a reputation that when John Munroe Longyear, a Michigan millionaireehad his large, 65 room house moved to Brookline, he chose Fisher Hill to be his neighborhood. (See form N-87) Continuing in this tradition as a neighborhood for distinguished Brookline citizens, the area had, among his residents, Joseph H. White, president of White, Payson, and Company; Arthur Rotch, a partner in the architectural firm of Rotch and Tilden and the creator of the Rotch Travelling Fellowship pf the Boston Society of Architects; and Galen Stone, founder of Hayden, Stone, the brokerage house. Henry Whitney, the developer of the West End Street Railway, also lived here, as did such internationally known musicians as Arthur Fiedler, Serge Koussevitsky, Eric Leinsdorf, and Boris Goldovsky.

During the 20th century, Jacob Pierce's wish for a "high class" neighborhood which would be restricted to the construction of residential properties was crystallized into a restrictive agreement. Property owners such as Ralph Stewart and Frank Merrill of Dean Road; Nathanial Walker of Buckminster Road; and William Ruhl of Druce Street as well as Frederick Emery of Willard Road and Howard Gilmore of Holland Road drew up a covenant which they felt would secure the neighborhood against injury and preserve the rural beauty and open country aspects of their homes and streets.

This covenent, entiered into by 165 property owners in the district, was signed in 1914. It ensured their holdings against "deterioration through the construction of apartment houses, two family houses, public garages, stores, and hospitals." Impetus for this legal arrangement came from the development of nearby Aspinwall Hill where "erecting of the wooden triple decker apartment houses and consequent reduction in that section of the value of adjoining or nearby single family dwellings had caused alarm among Fisher Hill residents. The covenant was designed to be valid through 1940; since that time, zoning laws have, in many respects, accomplished much of the intent of the covenant. In addition, the Fisher Nill Neighborhood Association remains an active and influential group; a "watchdog" against undesirable development.

I am writing to confirm the items we discussed over the phone recently. First, I have forwarded your objection to the listing of your house in the Fisher Hill Historic District (Brookline, MRA) to the National Park Service in Washington (see attached). As I explained, the MHC received your objection on January 23, 1986, too late for it to be reviewed as part of the NPS' National Register listing process. The Brookline MRA was listed in the Register on October 17, 1985.

However, I understand your concerns that your objection be included in the files regarding the Fisher Hill Historic District. The MHC will maintain your comments and a copy of your objection in our files. I also acknowledge that the Massachusetts Historical Commission received a phone call from you at the time of the nomination (June 1985) in which you stated your objection to the nomination of your property and explained the difficulty of obtaining a notarized objection at that time.

As I explained, the effects of National Register listing on a privately owned property are negligible. The property is afforded limited protection from the actions of federal and state governments and, if income producing, is eligible for an investment tax credit if a certified historic rehabilitation is undertaken.

There are no restrictions on the actions of a private property owner, provided public funds are not involved. Private owners of National Register property may use, maintain and dispose of their property in any way they see fit without government intervention. There are no limitations or restrictive covenants placed on a property as a result of National Register listing. The National Register was established for planning purposes and as a means of recognizing historically or architecturally significant properties.
