Describe present and historic physical appearance.

This Denver Mountain Park District consists of three contiguous parks which together form one large, diverse park facility. The three parks are Corwina, O'Fallon and Pence. Corwina is 157.82 acres, O'Fallon is 860 acres, and Pence The majority of these lands were included in the Olmsted is 320 acres. Brother's acquisition plan as part of the Bear Mountain Tract. Olmsted designated this tract first in importance for acquisition and stated in his plan that "this tract includes many points of interest and in all includes the greatest variety of interests to be found in any one region so near the City." Not all of the 4000 acre Bear Mountain Tract was purchased, yet enough was acquired so that Olmsted's statement still remains true. These three parks contain some of the most attractive gently sloping areas along Bear Creek, include beautiful areas along the serene Myers Gulch, and encompass a long mountain ridge which affords good views to the north, east, and west. The parks remain separate entities yet work very well as one large park facility with different focal points and diverse scenic elements.

Corwina Park

Corwina Park is located adjacent to Bear Creek within a wider part of the canyon. The park has a sloping creek edge for good accessibility and level spots ideal for picnicking. Here one finds an excellent section of creek for mountain fishing and relaxation near forested mountains. The park has large rock outcrops and steep cliff backdrops along the creek which provide a diverse and attractive park setting. Along the creek and roadside many different wildflowers can be seen.

Corwina Park was purchased in 1916 and developed with fire pits, picnic tables, a playground and a shelter house by 1920. The shelter house, built in 1918, is located on a north facing slope which provides shady relief on hot summer days. The shelter is constructed of native stone and wood and fits into the mountain slope overlooking Bear Creek. The front remains open to allow views to the creek and northern mountains, while the sides have large window openings and built in benches. A stone fireplace was constructed on the west side of the structure. A simple pedestrian suspension bridge, built in 1918, links users to the picnic and shelter facilities on the south side of Bear Creek. Corwina Park had a well dug in 1918 to provide water along the Bear Creek Canyon Road. The stone fireplace, the shelter house and the footbridge are the three contributing resources in this park.

In the early 1900's Bear Creek created a oxbow which ran along the northeastern portion of the park. Old Bear Creek Canyon Drive followed the original creek course and ran along the edge of the creek hugging that north canyon wall. In more recent years, the tightly curved section of Bear Creek Canyon Drive, which ran around the oxbow, was rerouted. These improvements provided more gentle curves for safer driving. The original oxbow area is now a grass picnic and volleyball site. The northern rim of the site is lined with large cottonwoods and willows and is bounded on the north by the old roadbed. Two small dirt parking lots are on the north and south side of the new road alignment to provide easy access to Bear Creek and the picnic site. The old road curving around the oxbow is now only accessible to pedestrians and has a small recently constructed restroom facility. Although these changes were made recently, the park has been carefully designed to create an attractive facility which is an asset to the overall park layout while, leaving the remnants of the old roadbed and stream corridor so historical interpretation can still be made.

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The south side of the park which includes the vast majority of the park acreage has had only minor changes. The natural environment of rocky cliffs and dense pine forests remains intact. All the rest of Bear Creek, within Corwina Park, remains an undisturbed rapid flowing mountain stream. The large rock formations and forested edges of the stream still exist. All the mountain lands of the park are intact and have had little disturbance since no formalized trail access exists. The pedestrian suspension bridge was recently repaired and still retains its original character. Two of the original stone fire pits remain amongst the same trees which existed in 1920. These trees now measure at least three feet in circumference.

Even though the picnic shelter house is not in good repair it is considered contributing. The roof of the shelter is deteriorated and the fireplace is in disrepair but the original stone walls still exist and repairs could be made which would rehabilitate the structure. There are also two new restrooms and a concrete fireplace which are non-contributing resources.

Even though road and creek alignment alterations have occurred in a small section of the park and the picnic shelter is in disrepair, the vast majority of the park is intact. Very few people would ever notice the small area where the stream alignment was altered. The stream still curves and retains the character of a rapidly moving mountain stream. The huge rock outcrops, steep cliffs and vast forested mountain lands still remain virtually undisturbed. Corwina Park has retained its integrity and still serves the users for which it was originally intended.

O'Fallon Park__

Acquired in 1938, O'Fallon Park was one of the last major mountain park acquisitions. This 860 acre park provides the link between Pence and Corwina Parks and unifies these parks. O'Fallon Park contains a section of Bear Creek as well as a long mountain ridge which separates Myers Gulch from a smaller eastern drainage. The park contains the largest virtually level grounds along Bear Creek within the Mountain Park System. This relatively large valley area, nestled between the canyons of Bear Creek, provides an excellent setting for a variety of recreational activities. The park has many picnic sites, baseball fields, volleyball areas, and has one of the few designated trails which exist in the Mountain Park System. A number of huge willows and cottonwoods are located along the creek. Rock outcrops and forests exist along sections of the stream and a ponderosa pine forest exists along the entire southern section of the park.

O'Fallon Park was owned by George Bancroft, a well known mining and water engineer, who sold the property to Martin O'Fallon with the knowledge that Mr. O'Fallon intended to donate the land to Denver for a mountain park.

Soon after the purchase, the park was equipped with fireplaces, picnic tables, a hiking trail, an outhouse, and a unique group fireplace high on a slope overlooking Bear Creek and Bear Creek Canyon Drive. The unusual fireplace provides five fireplaces which are connected to one tall central chimney. The stone structure originally had a small wooden roof covering all sides which was removed. The stone portion remains in good condition and still looms above the road as a distinctive sculptural element in the landscape. The only other structures include two metal outhouses and one of log construction typical of the Mountain Parks. At the far south end of the park is the old O'Fallon summer cottage which is privately owned. It has been altered and is non-contributing. There is one other small undeveloped parcel which is also privately owned. O'Fallon is the only park in the system with private ownership.

The beauty of the site has been retained and this park is one of the most used within the entire Denver Mountain Park System.

Pence Park

Pence Park is reached from Myers Gulch Road and is contiguous to the south end of O'Fallon Park. This park forms the western edge of this park district. Pence Park was one of the first parcels purchased off the original circle loop drive within the Mountain Park System. Pence Park is along Myers Gulch Road which links to Turkey Creek and the Turkey Creek Mountain Parks.

Pence Park encompasses the beautiful northern mountain slopes of Independence Mountain, one of the largest montane mountains in the area at 8370 feet in elevation. The slopes within the park are covered with evergreens and face the mountain meadow valley of Myers Gulch. A large portion of this gulch is part of Pence Park. The gulch contains an abundance of wildflowers and grasses and provides a change from the surrounding forested slopes.

Pence Park, earlier called Dixie Park, was purchased in 1914 and consisted of 220 acres. In 1928 another acquisition was made which increased the park size to 320 acres. The park was changed to Pence Park to honor Mr. Pence, a member of the Denver Mountain Park Commission who dedicated many hours to ensure the quality development of the Mountain Park System.

A section of Myers Gulch Road runs through the park, along the forested ridge line of O'Fallon Park to the east and Myers Gulch valley to the west. The road gently curves through the park and provides access to the only developed portion of the site. Other than Myers Gulch Road, only a small dirt road crosses the part of the park that is closed to the public.

Located near the southern end of the park, where Myers Gulch Road rises to Dix Saddle are a dirt parking lot, a non-contributing dark toned log outhouse and numerous picnic sites. All the picnic sites, secluded among the evergreens, are on the Independence Mountain slope and face Myers Gulch.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

This park district is significant for criteria A for Entertainment and Recreation and Community Planning and Development and C for Landscape Architecture. Corwina, O'Fallon, and Pence Parks represent parks along a scenic drive or parkway system. They provide critical recreational and rest areas along the park and parkway system and are a good example within the Denver Mountain Park System. These parks exist along canyon drives and gulches and have access to beautiful mountain streams, meadowlands and the rocky mountain landscape.

Their significance is important to Community Planning as an extension of the ideals of city planning and the City Beautiful Movement into regional planning. These parks provide the important open space separation between the mountain communities of Indian Hills and Kittridge and preserve the beautiful Myers Gulch and the attractive slopes of several mountains.

This park district is significant to Landscape Architecture as part of the Olmsted Brother's acquisition plan. He designated most of these lands as top priority in terms of acquisition and stated how valuable they were because of their diverse scenic and recreation potential close to the City, thus establishing their significance to Entertainment and Recreation.

The landscape design of the parks was kept simple. From the road, users have access to diverse recreation facilities while many acres are conserved for only passive recreation of visual resources. This helps preserve the area's natural and environmental resources and, together with the other mountain parks contributes to its significance to conservation.







We are pleased to inform you that the above mentioned property will be considered by the Historic Preservation Review Board for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places and State Register. The National Register of Historic Places is the Federal government's official list of historic properties worthy of preservation. Listing in the National Register provides recognition and assists in preserving our Nation's heritage.

Listing of the property/district provides recognition of the community's historic importance and assures protective review of Federal projects that might adversely affect the character of the historic property/district. If the property/district is listed in the National Register, certain Federal investment tax credits for rehabilitation and other provisions may apply.

Listing in the National Register does not mean that limitations will be placed on the properties by the Federal government. Public visitation rights are not required of owners. The Federal government will not attach restrictive covenants to the properties or seek to acquire them.

You are invited to attend the State Review Board meeting at which the nomination will be considered on December 1, 1989, at the Colorado History Museum, 1300 Broadway, Denver. I am writing in regard to the nomination of Corwina, Pence and O'Fallon Parks and the matter of owner objection. As we explained in our submission letter this nomination went through the notification process twice because the owners of the two private parcels were not notified the first time. The names and addresses of the private property owners were obtained from the Jefferson County Tax Assessor's Office in September of 1989. The nomination was scheduled for the Colorado Historic Preservation Review Board meeting on December 1, 1989. The notification of the nomination went out to the four private property owners (see enclosed copies), the Denver Parks Department and the public officials on October 24, 1989. The notification followed the procedures as specified in 36 CFR 60.6(c).

Two of the owners, Walter and Linda Blakeley objected to the nomination. The letter of objection was submitted to the Register with the nomination. We did not receive an objection from the other two owners, Hugh and Marjorie Dewig.

The Blakeleys own a vacant parcel which is for sale - Parcel #012097. The Dewigs own the noncontributing O'Fallon House - Parcel #012396.

Since a majority of the private property owners did not object to the listing, we request that Corwina, Pence and O'Fallon Parks be listed in the National Register.
